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Propositions

1. Children growing up in families experiencing complex and multiple problems benefit to some extent from their participation in family-focused home-visiting services. (this dissertation)
2. The lack of child-centred care activities shows that children are insufficiently involved in services for families experiencing complex and multiple problems. Providing more child-centred care is necessary to improve the outcomes of children growing up in these families. (this dissertation)
3. Simultaneous child-focussed and family-focussed care professional seem to improve the wellbeing of children growing up in families experiencing complex and multiple problems. (this dissertation)
4. Building a personal relationship is essential for professionals working with children growing up in families experiencing complex and multiple problems. Ruth (17 years): "First she bonded with me, then she gained my trust, and then we started talking" (this dissertation)
5. Child and Youth Coaching is a promising programme for improving the psychosocial skills of children growing up in families experiencing complex and multiple problems. (this dissertation)
6. Including children in care should be embedded in services for families experiencing complex and multiple problems. (this dissertation)
